UPDATE: Ontario Health Clinical Recommendations for Antiviral Therapy for Adults with Mild to Moderate COVID-19 & New LU codes for nirmatrelvir/ritonavir (Paxlovid)

Ontario Health (OH) has updated its clinical <u>Recommendations for Antiviral Therapy for Adults with Mild to Moderate COVID-19</u>. The update includes:

- Updated guidance for when antiviral therapy is **recommended** and when it **may be considered** based on a healthcare provider's clinical judgment.
- An updated list of risk factors that are associated with more severe COVID-19 outcomes.
- Changes to the COVID-19 severity classification.
- An overview of the real-world evidence for antiviral therapies.

NOTE: Funding for nirmatrelvir/ritonavir (Paxlovid®) will <u>transition to typical models</u> in May 2024 including select government drug benefit programs, private insurance, or payment directly by patients. Federal government procurement of Paxlovid® has ended.

Update: Immunization Record Submission and Catch-up Immunization for JK to Grade 5

The Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) is sending out immunization notices to families of elementary students with no immunization record on file at the health unit or who are missing immunizations. SMDHU does not have clinic capacity to see all students requiring immunizations. Therefore, SMDHU will be directing families with a primary care provider (PCP) to book an appointment to receive the vaccines they require. SMDHU will continue to offer catch-up immunization clinics for students who are behind on their required vaccinations under the ISPA and who do not have a PCP. The following table outlines the schedule of notices sent to students whose record on file with the health unit is not update to date according to the ISPA:

When you provide immunizations to school age children in your practice, be sure to remind parents that they need to report this information to the health unit so that their child's record on file can be updated. Through our immunization surveillance process, we find many children have received the vaccines, but they just have not reported the information to the health unit. Ensuring that patients know to report the information to the health unit at the time the vaccines are received, will prevent them from receiving notifications from us years later and having to contact your practice to obtain the information needed to update their record.
